aural (adj.) Of or pertaining to the organ of hearing.

oculist (n.) A specialist or expert in the treatment of eye disorders and

defects; an ophthalmologist; an optician.

invisible (adj. and n.) A. That cannot be seen; that by its nature is not an

object of sight. Not in sight; not to be seen at a particular place or time, or by a particular person. **B.** An invisible thing, person, or being.

indivisible (adj. and n.) A. Not divisible; incapable of being divided (actually, or

in thought); incapable of being distributed among a number; tincapable of being separated or detached, inseparable **B.** That

which is indivisible; an infinitely small particle or quantity.

expect (v.) **A.** To regard as probable or imminent; to envisage; to anticipate.

B. To require (something) in fulfilment of a justifiable or reasonable

expectation; to require (an anticipated action or thing) from or of a

person. **C.** To foresee or look forward to the arrival of (a person, esp.

a guest). **D.** Of a woman or a couple: to have the birth of (a child) in

prospect; to have (a baby) on the way. Chiefly in progressive tenses.

audible (adj. and n.) A. Perceptible to the ear; capable of being heard. B. A

thing which may be heard. (Used as a noun here. Often used this

way in football.)

disgust (n.) **A.** Strong distaste or disrelish for food in general, or for any

particular kind or dish of food; sickening physical disinclination to

partake of food, drink, medicine, etc.; nausea, loathing. B. Strong

repugnance, aversion, or repulsion excited by that which is

loathsome or offensive, as a foul smell, disagreeable person or

action, disappointed ambition, etc.; profound instinctive dislike or

dissatisfaction.

ingest (v.) To introduce (aliment) into the stomach (or mouth); to take in (food).

impalpable (adj.) **A.** Incapable of being felt by the organs of touch; imperceptible to the touch; intangible. Said of things immaterial; also, of very fine powder, in which no grit is perceptible when it is rubbed between the fingers. **B.** Incapable of being (readily) grasped or apprehended by the mind; producing no definite mental impression; 'intangible'.

tangible (adj. and n.) **A.** Capable of being touched; affecting the sense of touch; touchable. **B.** A thing that may be touched; something material or objective.

tacit (adj.) **A.** Unspoken, unvoiced; silent, emitting no sound; noiseless, wordless. **B.** Not openly expressed or stated, but implied; understood, inferred.

detective (adj. and n.) **A.** Having the character or function of detecting; serving to detect; employed for the purpose of detection. **B.** One whose occupation it is to discover matters artfully concealed; particularly (and in the original application as short for *detective policeman*, or the like) a member of the police force employed to investigate specific cases, or to watch particular suspected individuals or classes of offenders. *private detective*, one not belonging to the police force, who in his private capacity, or as attached to a Detective Agency or Bureau, undertakes similar services for persons employing him.

aureate (adj.) Golden, gold-colored. Brilliant or splendid as gold, *esp.* in literary or rhetorical skill; *spec.* designating or characteristic of a highly ornamental literary style or diction

argent (n. and adj.) **A.** The metal silver. **B.** Of, or resembling, silver; silvery white.

ferriferous (adj.) Producing or yielding iron; containing iron compounds or ore.
